What quilt-related item(s) are you working on right now? My challenge quilt, 2 of the 6-point table toppers, binding a quilt my mother left for my sister, and binding a baby quilt my mother made 50 years ago.

What other hobbies do you have? I love reading, crochet and knitting, embroidery by hand as well as by machine.

Tell about one way that quilting has changed your life. Joining the Guild has given me a chance to get involved with people who love quilting, and I love learning from them and getting to know everyone. It gives me a little push to do something instead of being lazy.

Are you on any committees with the CRQG? Now I am the day secretary and hope to help in another way next year.
