- 3) Wheelchair bags
- 4) Walker bags
- 5) Bibs

I will be collecting items through November.

GOLDEN SCISSORS



Remember to record your name, quilt, details in the Golden Scissors book at meetings.

A Golden Scissor Charm is awarded for a completed quilt with a minimum measurement of 220" around the perimeter of the quilt.

Golden Scissors Rules

- The quilt should be completed in the same year the award is given.
- The quilt must be completely finished, quilted and bound.
- There must be a quilt label sewn into or onto the quilt with at least the quilter's name and date.
- The quilter presenting the quilt must have pieced the top.
- Piecing can be done by hand or by machine.
- Block-of-the-month, friendship, and round robin quilts assembled by the owner qualify for Awards.
- Whole cloth quilts are acceptable: however, no cheater quilts.
- Quilting may be either by hand or machine.
- Professional machine quilting and tied quilts are acceptable
- After earning 5 Golden Safety Pin Awards, they may be exchanged for 1 Golden Scissor Award.
- Both a written record of the Award and a Photo will be kept permanently by the guild.

The record will include: the quilter's name, the name of the quilt and awards given

TRAVELING QUILTERS

As luck would have it, Jill Stroer and I were both in Anchorage last September, but just missed each other. She arrived the day that I left. But we both managed to find a quilt shop or two or three or... up in Alaska.

ANCHORAGE

Jill was in town for several days and had a car so could wander about more than I could in one day.

Quilt Tree

Jill says this is a good-sized shop, beautiful inside and out. (The growing season in Alaska is short but the days are very long so there are flowers everywhere, in beds, window boxes and hanging baskets) There is a selection of Alaska-themed batiks as well as Kaffe Fassetts, blenders and bright and cheery fabrics as well as trims, notions and samples. And nice people!

The Quilted Raven

This shop is close by the Visitors Center in downtown Anchorage so gets lots of visitors. It's not big, but it is stuffed with Alaska-themed batiks, florals, brights, patterns and notions. Perfect for the out-of-towners are kits with pattern and fabric of Alaska sights and animals, ideal for quilting souvenirs. I must confess that I still have a box of Alaska fabrics and patterns bought on other trips to the 49th state so I didn't buy anything there. However, they have a sister shop of yarns across the street. It was closed, but I looked pitiful and disappointed so someone from the back was volunteered to open the shop for me, especially when I told them I was interested in Quivit, which is Musk Ox yarn. I didn't buy any the last time I was there. The natural color is a cocoa brown which is not my color. Plus, the stuff was wicked expensive. Now they have blends of Quivit and silk, cashmere or Merino wool in bright colors. It's still wicked expensive but I chose two skeins of a gorgeous, deep purple. I gave the clerk my card but asked her not to tell me how much!

KODIAK

Flying Geese Fabric & Quilts

This is a wonderful shop tucked away on a side street. My husband remembered it and walked right to it. I'd probably still be looking for it and, trust me, Kodiak isn't that big! The owner is very friendly, helpful, and happy to talk quilts. I was her only customer (I might have been the only quilter on our cruise) so took my time to pick up a very challenging applique pattern and a much easier salmon wallhanging kit.

The Rookery Yarn Shop

Located a short block from the Flying Geese this is a BIG yarn shop. Alaskans knit and quilt a lot in the winter. I visited The Rookery on a previous trip to Kodiak and was overwhelmed by the selection. Alas, this time it was closed.
