PRESIDENT'S DESK

I'm sure that everyone reading this knows that I have never made a quilt. However, I have surprised myself this summer by thinking about quilting at odd times. It happens while I'm mowing the grass or when I'm breaking up long sticks so that they fit into the little burn barrel in the backyard. Perhaps it's the repetitive back and forth aspect of pushing the mower across the entire yard one row at a time, or the time required to break a few large branches into many small pieces. Repetition and cutting. Just add sewing, and you're quilting.

The trouble with yard work is that when you've finished cutting the grass, you have to repeat the entire process next week in the same yard that you've mowed since you bought the house. The sticks burn and there's nothing left but a little ash. Yard work doesn't produce anything durable, and unless you're getting fancy with the hedge trimmers, there is no tangible artwork. Quilters create art. I am continually amazed by your creations during Show and Tell, and every quilt show I've attended has several gems. Meanwhile, all I have to show from mowing the lawn are those little pieces of grass that get tracked into the house after the next rain. And yes, I've also thought about quilting while vacuuming.

I've said that my trouble with quilting is that I can't use my favorite tools. Duct tape doesn't work, and I do intuitively realize that a nail gun is a very bad choice for securing that loose button on my green shirt - especially if I'm wearing it. Quilts are not assembled with screws, and bindings are not attached with electric staplers. However, quilters have rotary cutters, rulers, and sewing machines. As a bonus, there are nearly unlimited color and texture choices in fabric, and thread is available in infinitely more colors than fishing line.

Perhaps I could learn to use new tools. The wife has a Singer Featherweight that calls to me while I'm oiling the lubrication points. The gadgets in the Martelli Sewing and Quilting Center in Pensacola whispered to me when The Wife and I visited this past spring. "Buy me," they said, "You will love to quilt if you take us home with you." It was the same whisper that I hear when I walk down the aisles at Ace Hardware.

Perhaps I might take up quilting someday. The Wife would be happy to teach me if I asked her. But it won't be today. Today I have to go outside and mow the grass again.

Remember to record your name, quilt, details in the Golden Scissors book at meetings.

A Golden Scissor Charm is awarded for a completed quilt with a minimum measurement of 220" around the perimeter of the quilt.

Golden Scissors Rules

The quilt should be completed in the same year the award is given.

- The quilt must be completely finished, quilted and bound.
- There must be a quilt label sewn into or onto the quit with at least the quilters name and date.
- The quilter presenting the quilt must have pieced the top.
- Piecing can be done by hand or by machine.
- Block-of-the-month, friendship, and round robin quilts assembled by the owner qualify for Awards.
- Whole cloth quilts are acceptable: however, no cheater quilts.
- Quilting may be either by hand or machine.
- Professional machine quilting and tied quilts are acceptable
- After earning 5 Golden Safety Pin Awards, they may be exchanged for 1 Golden Scissor Award.
- Both a written record of the Award and a Photo will be kept permanently by the guild.

The record will include: the quilter's name, the name of the quilt and awards given
