PRESIDENT'S DESK

This past week at the January night meeting, the program for the evening was a game by the name of Quilto. It was interesting to listen to the room during each game. Common words such as "batting," "seams" and "threads" didn't elicit much of a reaction from the players unless someone completed a row and hollered "Quilto!" However, when "don't do buttons" was called out, there were a lot of comments in full agreement with the phrase. I'm not sure why. Buttons date back to about 2000 BC and were originally used by rich or important people as ornamental decorations or embellishments and they are still used in the same way today by quilters (including some members of our guild). I suspect that it is not the button that causes such consternation when it appears during a game of Quilto. It must be the button hole; a relatively new source of anxiety dating back only to the 13th century.

A word that elicited enthusiastic comments was "shop." There was hearty agreement with that sentiment. Everyone in the room apparently loves to shop, and it was probably a good thing for our pocketbooks that it was a dark and stormy night and that all of the stores nearing closing time. I didn't see anyone making out a shopping list on the back of their Quilto card, but I suspect some were adding to a list previously started on their phones. Since I'm not a quilter, I wasn't adding to my list, but I was wondering (if The Wife had wanted to go shopping) if we might have stopped by the Waffle House for a quarter cheese plate scattered, covered and smothered on the way home.

The word with the loudest reaction (and outright laughter from the participants) was "economy." There is nothing economical about quilting. Quilting requires shopping, the Waffle House raised their prices 2 years ago, and have you seen the cost of buttons? The last time The Wife made a shirt for me with fabric from a quilt store, the buttons cost nearly as much as the fabric! Yes, "economy" definitely caused a commotion every time is was called that evening.

So why quilt? Perhaps because quilters are artists and quilting allows us to express our individual, unique gift of creativity. I have always found it interesting to go to a quilt show presented by a quilting class. Everyone makes the same quilt pattern during the class, but none of the quilts are the same. The fabric choices made by some of the students speak to me when I look at their work. However, other students apparently tripped over a whirligig and landed on a button hole while they were at the store selecting their fabric. Their quilts implore me to "Dial 911."

Gallon Bag Challenge

If you want to participate in the Gallon Bag Challenge this year, you will need to prepare a gallon bag with various fabrics. You may also include things like buttons, zippers, bells, etc. When your bag is full, write your name on the bag and turn it in to Dawn Feist before the end of the March night meeting.

Your bag will be distributed to one of the challenge participants and you will receive a bag from a different participant in return.

The challenge is to make something for the person whose bag you receive using some or all of the contents of the bag. Your project may include additional fabrics or notions from your stash; you are not limited to the contents of the bag. You decide what you will make and present to that person at a night meeting later in the year. At that meeting, you will also receive a finished project from the person who had your gallon bag



Remember to record your name, quilt, details in the Golden Scissors book at meetings.

A Golden Scissor Charm is awarded for a completed quilt with a minimum measurement of 220" around the perimeter of the quilt.

Golden Scissors Rules

The quilt should be completed in the same year the award is given.

- The quilt must be completely finished, quilted and bound.
- There must be a quilt label sewn into or onto the quit with at least the quilters name and date.
- The quilter presenting the quilt must have pieced the top.
- Piecing can be done by hand or by machine.
- Block-of-the-month, friendship, and round robin quilts assembled by the owner qualify for Awards.
- Whole cloth quilts are acceptable: however, no cheater quilts.
- Quilting may be either by hand or machine.
- Professional machine quilting and tied quilts are acceptable
- After earning 5 Golden Safety Pin Awards, they may be exchanged for 1 Golden Scissor Award.
- Both a written record of the Award and a Photo will be kept permanently by the guild.

The record will include: the quilter's name, the name of the quilt and awards given

Editor's Note: my resolution for 2024 is to encourage quilters to label their quilts! This month's "encouraging" words are again from Kristen Hubert, Edinburgh, Scotland:

How Quilt Historians Use Quilt Labels

While most quilters now understand the value of adding quilt labels for future generations, that hasn't always been the case. We're often left to figure out the story behind a quilt based on unreliable memories or we may never know who made a quilt or why.

Quilt historians often use quilt labels to research and understand the development of quilt patterns, the popularity of methods and fabrics, the economic status of specific areas in specific time periods, and so much more.

Not to mention that the focus of a quilt may reflect what was occurring during that time. The context and reasoning may be obvious to us now, but future generations may have no idea how to place context around this. However, with quilt labels, quilt historians and those who inherit those quilts will.
