May 9, Day Marge Frost, Little Log Cabin Quilts

Watch as Marge shows how she chooses fabrics and assembles her little

wonders.

May 23, Night Ugly Fabric Fun & Tasty Tidbits

Bring one yard of ugly fabric and see what happens!

Here is a list of supplies you will need if you plan to sew along with Marge as she shows us how she makes the small Log Cabin Quilts we've seen at Show and Tell.

Rotary Cutter, cutting mat, scissors, ruler – at least 4" wide and 8" to 14 " long Sewing machine, thread, iron (plan to share)

Fabric scraps, very light, medium and dark, cut in strips at least

1" wide, in lengths from 1 ½ ", 2", 2 1/2, 3", 3 1/2" and 4". Plan to bring 5 or 6 of each length. I use a wide variety of colors and prints, small stripes, small checks and plaids. The very lights are also varied, mostly cream or light tan textures, stripes, anything goes!! I try to avoid pure white as it jumps up off the finished blocks. There is nearly always a red solid for the center, so bring some red solid. I will bring fabrics to shares in all the varieties I have listed.

Starting in April 2024, Ways and Means will only accept exact cash or checks. IOUs are confusing Broach and Jeanne.

September 26th, Night Meeting

- Bring goods to be auctioned in open boxes with your name on the boxes.
- If your box doesn't sell, you have to take it back home.
- Doors open at 4:30 for setup. Bring your boxes starting at 5:00. R'auction starts at 6:00 after short business meeting.
- You cannot pay for your purchases until R'auction is over. No IOUs. Cash or check.
- When your boxes arrive, a label will be placed on each box showing: BIDDER, PRICE, BOX NUMBER. You will receive a paddle with bidder number.
- Bid prices must be in increments of one dollar.
- You can bring boxes/sacks of scraps. Cotton fabric only.
- I need: helpers to setup and label boxes and put away tables and chairs. Two people to run computer and keep up with who bought what.

The Spelman College Museum of Fine Art Presents Threaded, a New Exhibition Featuring Textile Works by Contemporary Black Women Artists

The foundation of the exhibit is seven newly conserved quilts from the Gee's Bend Quilt Collective, an Alabama quilting community in the Spelman Museum permanent collection. These works are joined by a quilt from the Clark Atlanta University Art Museum collection and 10 additional prints, also by Gee's Bend.

Artists featured in *Threaded* include Louisiana Bendolph, Mary Lee Bendolph, Polly Bennett, Willie Ann Benning, Bisa Butler, Helen McBride, Flora Moore, Ruth Pettway Mosely, Ebony G. Patterson, Loretta Pettway, Bettie Bendolph Seltzer, Phyllis Stephens, Sonie Joi Thompson-Ruffin, Qualeasha Wood and Billie Zangewa.

The exhibit will be free to the public Wednesday through Saturday, 12 p.m. - 5 p.m. from February 2 - May 24, 2024, at the Spelman College's Museum of Fine Art.

NOTE: the address is

350 Spelman Ln SW, Atlanta, GA 30314, but Google maps has a wrong turn at the end. Do NOT turn right at the intersection of Lee Street & Westview. Instead, go through that light (toward Morehouse) and then immediately turn right into the parking lot.



Remember to record your name, quilt, details in the Golden Scissors book at meetings.

A Golden Scissor Charm is awarded for a completed quilt with a minimum measurement of 220" around the perimeter of the quilt.

Golden Scissors Rules

The quilt should be completed in the same year the award is given.

- The quilt must be completely finished, quilted and bound.
- There must be a quilt label sewn into or onto the quit with at least the quilters name and date.
- The quilter presenting the quilt must have pieced the top.
- Piecing can be done by hand or by machine.
- Block-of-the-month, friendship, and round robin quilts assembled by the owner qualify for Awards.
- Whole cloth quilts are acceptable: however, no cheater quilts.
- Quilting may be either by hand or machine.
- Professional machine quilting and tied quilts are acceptable
- After earning 5 Golden Safety Pin Awards, they may be exchanged for 1 Golden Scissor Award.
- Both a written record of the Award and a Photo will be kept permanently by the guild.

The record will include: the quilter's name, the name of the quilt and awards given

CHALLENGE QUILTS

Clue

Each person chooses three cards from a standard "Clue" game. They then have to represent those three 'clues' somehow in their quilt. The people (Professor Plum, Ms. Scarlet etc) could be easy as they can represent the color (but they don't have to), the rooms and weapons will be the tricky part.

The Rope ... could be a rope quilting motif, or a couched thread as an embellishment

Lead Pipe ... something grey, something long and thin

Conservatory ... use floral fabric, applique flowers and vines

Example: Mrs Peacock in the Dining Room with the Revolver could be Peacock feathers forming a Dresden Plate (dining room), quilted in concentric circles (revolver).

There is no size restriction to the challenge, it can be a pillow, bag, wall hanging, quilt any size, ect. It is due the night meeting in October.

QUILT LABELS

From Quilt Alliance

Quilt Alliance is a nonprofit 501c3 organization established in 1993 with a mission to document, preserve, and share our American quilt heritage by collecting the rich stories that historic and contemporary quilts, and their makers, tell about our nation's diverse peoples and their communities.

Three Key Steps to Documenting a Quilt

Quilts are historical documents that contain important information about the life and times of the maker, their family and their world. Here are **three key steps** that every quilt owner should take to keep their quilt's history from fading away.

- **1. Label your quilt.** Include, at minimum: maker's name, date completed, location made, maker or owner's contact information.
- **2.** Take photos of your quilt. Take an overall photo, front and back, a photo with the maker/owner standing alongside the quilt, and several details including the label.
- 3. Write down your quilt's story. Include, at minimum, the information you wrote on the label. Add additional physical details (size, fiber content, materials, care...), history of the maker, purpose of the quilt, influence or inspiration.
