PROGRAMS

March 13, Day Meeting:

Kawandi Quilt Class. Make a small quilt using your scraps, the more colorful the better. No machines needed! The supply list is on the next page

March 27, Night Meeting: "

.A professional blade sharpener will be available to sharpen all your dull scissors & knives. Priced from \$5-\$15.

Kawandi Quilt Project Supply List

Backing Fabric: 18"x 22" square or one fat quarter.

Batting (thin): 17"x 21" square. One inch smaller than fat quarter

Can also use flannel or cotton fabric)

Embroidery Needles: Size 7 or size comfortable for you.

Quilting Thread: 12 weight in White or Ecru or Pearl Cotton 8 or DMC floss.

Basting thread: basic thread in neutral color.

Scissors

Iron (optional)

Fabrics: light weight loosely woven, lots of colorful cottons scraps.

Caution: Batiks are much more difficult to hand quilt due to the tight weave of the fabric and you will be sewing through layers.

*This is a quilt as you go project. Please don't agonize over threads & needles. I personally like the look of the thicker thread. However, you can use what you have on hand.

Preparation Prior to class:

Your backing fabric will determine the finished size of your Kawandi.

Fold and press outer edges of all four sides of backing fabric with 1 inch crease. Place batting edges into the folds. Your quilt sandwich is 2/3's complete!

Gallon Bag Challenge

If you want to participate in the Gallon Bag Challenge this year, you will need to prepare a gallon bag with various fabrics. You may also include things like buttons, zippers, bells, etc. When your bag is full, write your name on the bag and turn it in to Dawn Feist before the end of the March night meeting.

Your bag will be distributed to one of the challenge participants and you will receive a bag from a different participant in return.

The challenge is to make something for the person whose bag you receive using some or all of the contents of the bag. Your project may include additional fabrics or notions from your stash; you are not limited to the contents of the bag. You decide what you will make and present to that person at a night meeting later in the year. At that meeting, you will also receive a finished project from the person who had your gallon bag.

2025 Challenge Rules



ROLL OF THE DICE QUILT CHALLENGE

The Roll of the Dice Quilt Challenge is a fun way to create a quilt by adding a twist of chance. You will roll TWO DICE, two times. Roll TWO DICE to find out which two blocks you will use. Then, roll TWO DICE to find out which two colors you will use! The rest is up to you. Do you want to add borders, appliqué, sashing? That is up to you... Let your creative juices run wild!








Remember to record your name, quilt, details in the Golden Scissors book at meetings.

A Golden Scissor Charm is awarded for a completed quilt with a minimum measurement of 220" around the perimeter of the quilt.

Golden Scissors Rules

The quilt should be completed in the same year the award is given.

- The quilt must be completely finished, quilted and bound.
- There must be a quilt label sewn into or onto the quit with at least the quilters name and date.
- The quilter presenting the quilt must have pieced the top.
- Piecing can be done by hand or by machine.
- Block-of-the-month, friendship, and round robin quilts assembled by the owner qualify for Awards.
- Whole cloth quilts are acceptable: however, no cheater quilts.
- Quilting may be either by hand or machine.
- Professional machine quilting and tied quilts are acceptable
- After earning 5 Golden Safety Pin Awards, they may be exchanged for 1 Golden Scissor Award.
- Both a written record of the Award and a Photo will be kept permanently by the guild.

The record will include: the quilter's name, the name of the quilt and awards given
