

NO LIBRARY CARD NEEDED

Robin Meyer donated seven books to the library. She also donated several books for the R'Auction.

1. *A Garden Party of Quilts* by Joen Wolfrom. Seven projects using beautiful pieced flower blocks. Templates are included. Blocks are stunning with batiks or hand-dyed fabrics.
2. *Quick and Easy Projects for the Weekend Quilter*, edited by Rosemary Wilkinson. Two dozen quilts that are very colorful and easy.
3. *The Quilters' Recipe Book* by Celia Eddy. One hundred block designs. All show variations on setting the blocks. Nice if you are looking for a different way to place your blocks.
4. *Potting Shed Patchwork* by Nancy J. Martin. Fourteen pieced and appliquéd projects. All feature flower garden themes. Some are whimsical and fun to look at.
5. *Love to Machine Appliqué* by Caroline Price. Hand appliquéd can be time consuming. This book shows several techniques to appliqué by machine. Detailed instructions and samples of stitches.
6. *Just Can't Cut It!* by Pamela Mostek. Don't we all have beautiful fabrics that we are loathe to cut? These projects showcase these fabrics to their best advantage.
7. *Log Cabin Fever* by Evelyn Sloppy. These log cabin blocks range from baskets to hearts. All log cabin quilts look very different from one another.

September Workshop

Beads, Beads, Beads

Nationally known quilter Mary Stori (www.marystori.com) will teach us beading techniques that have practical applications for quilts and garments. Mary offers an in-depth discussion about beads; the care, storage, equipment needs, and stabilizing methods. In the morning, we will create a reference sampler of basic stitches. We'll also learn to attach beads, charms, buttons, trinkets, & unusual objects. The afternoon focus is more decorative stitches, including picot stitch, chain stitch, branched fringe, netting, bugle bead walls, bead embroidery, and more. Mary uses live video projection, so everyone has a front row seat! No sewing machines or prior beading experience needed! The fee is \$35 for CRQG members; \$45 for non-members. The workshop will be opened to non-members on July 1, so sign up soon. A kit fee of \$10 payable to Mary is also required. It contains all the beads, embellishments and thread that you will need. Charlene's Soda Cracker Delight

Combine in a Ziploc bag:

1 1-oz pkg Hidden Valley Ranch Dressing mix (dry)
½ teaspoon cayenne pepper

1 Cup vegetable oil
1 heaping teaspoon crushed red peppers

Zip bag shut and mix. Open bag and add 2 sleeves unsalted soda crackers and turn slowly over and over 'til all coated. Let sit overnight. In the morning, place on paper towels until dry (about 1 ½ hours).

Enjoy with cheese, etc.

GREEN IDEAS SUPPLY LIST JULY 8, 2010

We're going to learn some fun & practical ways to put our sewing room scraps to good use. We'll also be getting a little messy, so dress accordingly. I will have extra supplies marked as "optional," but feel free to bring your own. The supply list looks long, but you'll have most of these items in your home or studio already, and you can share with each other or shop at the \$1 store for some items.

General Supplies

- apron
- fabric scissors
- paper scissors
- reading glasses, if you need them for small work
- rags for clean-up
- pen and paper for notes
- a brown paper bag cut into 4 flat pieces for your working surface, press to flatten
- an assortment of small paint brushes, including one flat ½" wide and a tiny one for detail; I'll have some to share
- plastic box or sheet to protect your car on the way home from wet items
- 5 plastic bags to transport dyed or painted items (old bread bags, grocery bags, etc. will do)
- sewing needle (not a tiny hand quilting size)

Making Fabric Beads (hands on)

- a large plastic cup or container (32-oz. size is fine) filled 2/3 full with rice, dry beans, etc.
- optional: 3" to 6" long pieces of pretty threads (preferably scraps) for embellishing. For example: trimmings from metallic, variegated or silk threads or thin specialty yarns. I'll have some to share.

Making Cinnamon Roll Pincushions (demonstration, some hands on)

- If you'd like to try this demo and you have a **needle felting tool**, bring it to the workshop (with your **brush or foam base**). I'll have some wool for everyone and a few tools to share.

Making Wool Pincushions, Ball (hands on)

- one leg from a pair of panty hose
- twisty ties (3)
- optional: scraps of a favorite **wool** yarn to wrap around pincushion (1-2 yards long)

Fun with Iron-On Transfer Pens (hands on)

- 3 white fabric pieces 4" x 4" or larger

Altering Fabrics with Paints, Inks, and More (hands on)

- 2 pieces of white fabric with freezer paper pressed to the back, approx. 8" x 8"
- 2 pieces of white fabric (no freezer paper), approx. 8" x 8"
- optional: another fabric or two that you'd like to "color in;" for example, black & white fabrics
- optional: personal spray bottle with water
- optional: assorted colors of Sharpie or Bic Mark-It markers (other markers won't work)

As for all classes, don't forget to mark your tools with your name or initials. . .we all seem to have the same tools!

- and -

Don't worry if you don't have every single item. . .I'll have some extras. All fabric supply sizes are approximate; if you have a smaller piece, that's fine. Use pieces from your scrap bag if you can.

KALEIDOSCOPE QUILT WORKSHOP SUPPLY LIST – **WORKSHOP FULL** JULY 31, 2010

Basic Supplies

- sewing machine with ¼-inch foot
- basic sewing supplies
- rotary cutter and large mat
- rulers—one long 24" and one smaller one
- pencil
- 48" square flannel, batting, or flannel-backed tablecloth for a design wall
- 5 pair of strata—must be made before the workshop

Fabric Requirements

- For the strata: approximately 15 different fabrics for the strata; you will cut one or two pairs of strips from each one*
- Border: one yard—can also be used in the strata or something that coordinates

How to Make Your Strata

The goal is to create your own unique striped fabric by sewing sets of random width strips. You will need to make 5 matching pairs of strata (a total of ten strata). Strips are cut from selvedge to selvedge in widths between 1" and 2 ½". A completed strata should measure approximately 8" across the strips and be about 42" long.

Press the seams of one strata all in one direction. Press the seams of its identical mate all in one direction, too, but in the opposite direction from the first strata. Accurate ¼" seams will make the cutting and sewing process easier.

Strata must be made before the class begins!!

*Tip for making sure your 2 strips are exactly the same size: lay your fabric on the cutting mat folded selvedge to selvedge. Then fold your fabric one again—cut edge to cut edge. Trim this edge to make it straight. Now go ahead and cut your strip. You will have 2 identical strips.

BEADS, BEADS, BEADS SUPPLY LIST SEPTEMBER 2010

This class features live video projection allowing every student a front-row seat!!

General Supply List

- An 8" or 10" wooden embroidery hoop and two pieces of muslin to fit hoop. An inexpensive hoop will do if you want to keep your sampler in the hoop permanently as a reference. Or, substitute an 11" pvc quilting frame if you already own one. . .it's not necessary to purchase especially for this class.
- sewing needle—the smallest quilting between you can thread, sizes #10, #11, or #12 generally work well
- long, thin appliqué needle, size #10 or #11 (also known as a "sharp")
- small shallow dish for beads—avoid plastic if possible
- small sharp scissors or thread clips
- small ruler—6" long x 1" wide is adequate
- lead pencil
- Ott light and extension cord (optional). . .you may end up dragging it with you only to find it's not possible to plug in due to the room set-up. I always request a nice, bright classroom and when we are lucky. . .it's available!
- optional—permanent pen for making notes on muslin sampler

Supply Fee: \$10 payable to instructor is required. Kit contains all the beads, embellishment items, and thread.

Instructor will have her books, quilting betweeners, and some pvc frame available for purchase in class.
