

Treasurer's Report: The balance at meeting time was \$4,292.41.

Committee Reports

APRIL AND MAY PROGRAMS

April showers bring not only May flowers but also opportunities to learn and to share ideas for new quilting projects. Be sure to be at each meeting to take advantage of every learning opportunity.

April 8, 2010

Crazy Eight Strip Teaser – Table Topper Sandra Wilson

Sandra will show us how to make this great 4" x 4" table topper. Select holiday fabrics or colors to match your decor. It goes together really fast once you make the strips. The magic is in the cutting and piecing. We'll come with our strips sewn and spend our time cutting and assembling the topper so that you can go home ready to quilt. The program will last until about 3 o'clock. The pattern can be purchased for \$8.



Fabric Needed:

8 ¼-yard assorted fabrics ranging from light to dark using a variety of prints and textures (do not prewash fabric—you need almost every smidgen of the ¼ yard—and do not use fat quarters)

5/8 yard binding

- 1 ¼ yards backing
- 1 ¼ yards batting
- 12 1/2-inch square ruler (optional)

Cutting Instructions: Cut 6 - 1 %-inch WOF strips from each of the 8 fabrics. Do NOT cut off the selvages.

Sewing Instructions: Arrange each of the 8 fabrics in order of value, dark to light. Sew strips together to form a strata. Use a true and accurate ¼-inch seam. As each strip is attached to the strata, sew from the opposite direction. This will prevent the strata from bowing and keep the unit straight. Make 6 separate strata.

Pressing seams: Press seams in 3 strata toward the dark strip and the other 3 toward the light strip.

Tracy from Kiwi Quilts, the new quilt shop in Powder Springs, will introduce us to her new shop. She'll bring fabric, gadgets and news about the latest trends.

May 13, 2010

Funny Faces

Beverly Hammack

Come make a funny face of yourself, your family or your friends--or make several. Beverly will show us how. Supply list and photos are below. Program will last until 2:00 p.m.

For each face square, you will need:

- one 2" square of light to medium fabric for background
- a large scrap of fabric for the face
- various scraps of printed fabrics, including a large scrap of flowered material for the hair

Note: The three main fabrics – the background, face and hair – should contrast with one another.

Also,

- bonding material (I use "Misty Fuse" and will have some with me that you can buy)
- sewing machine
- threads
- scissors
- parchment paper two pieces that are 12 inches long

Mary Kay Mouton Flip-Flop Paper Piecing

Mary Kay brings us Flip-Flop Paper Piecing, a system that allows for very intricate designs and eliminates the "Y" seam. She'll also bring quilts and share with us the unlikely story of how she found a publisher for her book "Flip-Flop Paper Piecing" and became a first-time author.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Pillowcases for the Boys and Girls Club – Our current total stands at 147! We are well on our way to our goal of 175. . . and you thought it sounded impossible when I first mentioned it! Joyce Hill continues to lead the way in the individual number turned in with 94. . .she said it was a great way to use up all her odd ball and leftover fabrics. Maybe you can do the same with some of the fabric you've been hanging on to, and then you could buy more! I'll be glad to take 1 or 50, it doesn't matter—JUST DO IT!

Quilts for Douglas County Homeless Shelter – An offer was "put on the table" by a very generous couple in our Guild as a reward for those signing up to do a CSP quilt. The signup sheet was sent around the day meeting and filled quickly. However, in fairness to the evening meeting and because I'd like to have a few extra quilts for the shelter, I am not quite ready to "spill the beans" about what the reward is for those signing up. Guess you'll either have to come to the next day meeting or read the next newsletter. . .(I will list all those who will be rewarded in next month's newsletter).

Due date for both of these projects is set for August 1st, or the August day meeting. I will be glad to take them prior to this as I know some of you have quilts almost ready to hand over!

QUILTING CHALLENGES AND PLANS

Challenge Quilt: We have about 30 people who have chosen a fat quarter for the challenge quilt. We still have several fat quarters left and it is not too late to draw a fat quarter. This is going to be exciting as all our quilts will be different and any size you want.

Museum Raffle Quilt: We have chosen a pattern for the Museum Raffle Quilt from a book titled <u>A Passion for Piecing</u>. It is called EASY Peasy in the book, but we would rather call it Garden Trellis or something that makes more sense to us. It is made up of two blocks, one is a paper-pieced star and the other is a simple pieces block that looks like a trellis. It is not extremely difficult, but does require some expertise in quilting. We have bought the fabric and will be cutting it up next week. Then we will be ready to begin piecing. A date has not been set for sewing yet, but we are working on a date. We will probably begin the sewing in April. We will need paper-piecers, sewing machines and people to iron. If you don't feel comfortable sewing, you can help ironing and measuring.

WAYS AND MEANS

The winner of the day meeting raffle for March was Charlie Phaneuf. We made \$114 at the day meeting from the raffle and items sold.

The theme for the April day raffle is "A Quilter's Tea." This tea is a special batik blend which includes twenty $10 \% \times 10 \%$ inch batik squares in each "tea bag." This will be enough to make a $50^{\circ} \times 80^{\circ}$ quilt top if one chooses to use alternate blocks in between these fabrics; OR it is enough fabric to make a $40^{\circ} \times 50^{\circ}$ quilt top if NO alternating blocks are used. This special batik blend quilter's tea only needs a needle and thread to be enjoyed!

The winner of the night meeting raffle for March was Gail Ford. We earned \$70 at the night meeting from the raffle and items sold. Charlie made 6 CD's of the 2009 quilts for Show and Tell, and we sold those all out; while supplies last, we will be including a FREE CD of the Guild's 2008 Show and Tells.

Our theme for the April night meeting is "A Thimble Full." The "thimble" planter is "full" because it contains ¼" tiger tape, 5 spools of thread, straight pins, quilting safety pins, 3 small screwdrivers, seam ripper, thread heaven, stiletto, strawberry pin cushion, hand quilting needles, a scrubby to clean your mats, 120" tape measure, wrist pin cushion, and a bottle for broken or bent needles or pins.

Members: Please remember to purchase your raffle tickets as soon as you arrive at a meeting or at the break. Once the meeting/program starts after the break, the committee draws the winning ticket. Those

These stories featured GQC members over the age of 70, spotlighting the unique contributions these talented people have made to quilting in Georgia in addition to providing details of their interesting lives.

This first group of Silver Stitchers was honored at the GQC Spring Convention in 2005 where their wonderful quilts were displayed for all to enjoy.

ROBIN MEYER TO EXHIBIT AT PADUCAH IN THE 2010 AQS QUILT SHOW AND CONTEST

Our own Robin Meyer has been selected as a semifinalist for the 2010 AQS Quilt Show & Contest, April 21-24, at the Paducah Expo Center in Paducah, Kentucky. Robin has been chosen to display the quilt, Lake House Dahlia, along with 386 others in the annual contest now in its 26th year. Lake House Dahlia was awarded a blue ribbon at Georgia Celebrates Quilts (the ECQG quilt show) in 2009. Three quilting authorities will judge this elite group in Paducah, awarding first, second, and third place prizes in 15 categories, along with 9 overall awards. Winners will be announced at the Awards Presentation, which takes place at the Carson Four Rivers Center in Paducah on Tuesday, April 20. Cash awards totaling \$120,000 will be granted, with prizes including \$20,000 for the Janome Best of Show; \$12,000 for the Bernina Machine Workmanship;



\$12,000 for the AQS Hand Workmanship; \$12,000 for the Gammill Longarm Workmanship; and \$5,000 for the Moda Best Wall Quilt. Regardless of how Lake House Dahlia places in the final judging, all semifinalists' quilts will be displayed at the show, which is expected to draw more than 30,000 people.

AQS founder and president Meredith Schroeder says, "It is always exciting to see how quilt makers create such beauty using fiber and thread. The quilts in this 26th annual show exemplify excellent use of color and variety of quilting techniques by hand and by machine."

Quilts were entered in this international contest from 47 U.S. states and 10 other countries. The quilt artists employ a wide variety of techniques and design methods ranging from traditional pieced patterns to original painted and embellished motifs. Some of the special exhibits that will be featured along with the contest quilts include Passionate Patchwork by Kaffe Fassett and Liza Prior Lucy; AQS Landscape quilts; winners from the 2010 AQS Quilt Contest in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and the 2011 Pilgrim/Roy Invitational Challenge.

The American Quilter's Society hosts four shows annually, each with its own quilt contest. Besides their original Paducah show, AQS hosts other prestigious shows in Knoxville, Tennessee; Des Moines, Iowa; and the newest location, Lancaster, Pennsylvania.

The members of Cherokee Rose Quilters Guild wish Robin the best of luck in this venture. WE ARE SO PROUD OF HER!

NO LIBRARY CARD NEEDED

Linda Herren donated an appliqué book to the Guild, <u>Beyond Baltimore</u> by Brenda Henning. It has templates for stained glass appliqué using fusible bias tape by clover which is then stitched down. I liked the patterns; they are very pretty and look simple enough for an intermediate quilter to do.

FEATURED MEMBER JENNIE HOLLIS

How long have you been quilting? I've been quilting since 1990 when I found out I was going to be a grandmother for the first time.

Who taught you how to quilt? I taught myself to quilt with help from my sister and instructions in books and magazines.

What are your favorite quilting techniques? My favorite quilting technique is the ease and speed of chain piecing.

What are your favorite colors to work with? My favorite colors are red and yellow; I guess I like blue, too, because that is the color I have the most of in my fabric stash.

What are your favorite fabrics to work with? I love cotton and flannel. I am crazy about Kaffe Fasset fabrics.



What is your favorite quilt shop? My favorite quilt shops are Red Hen and Intown Quilts, although I don't get there very often.

If you sew by machine, what kind(s) do you use? I have a Pfaff 2042, a Kenmore with a nice machine blanket stitch, a Brother my husband got for me to take classes, and a small Singer.

What inspires you to make a particular quilt? I am inspired by patterns I see in books and magazines.

What quilt-related item(s) are you working on right now? Right now I am working on the log cabin blocks we made at our last day meeting.

What other hobbies do you have? My other hobbies are knitting, cooking (I love to try new recipes), and reading (I'm a fan of the Earlene Fowler books).

Tell about one way that quilting has changed your life. I have met and made so many friends through quilting. I will now try colors I normally don't like and more difficult techniques and designs.

Are you on any committees with the CRQG? I am the day librarian. I would like to go through all our books and weed out outdated books. When I was in high school, I wanted to be a librarian or a nun in a convent. I didn't do either.

Feel free to tell us more about yourself and your family. I grew up in Venice, California, the oldest of 5 children. We went to the beach almost every day but never learned to swim! I've raised 6 children and have 7 grandchildren. My only grandchild in Georgia is John who I am raising. I moved to Atlanta in 1969 and talked my sister into moving here in 1980. I recently retired and am enjoying it very much. I love road trips, usually with my twin, Irene. We often get lost, but that is half the fun.
