COMMUNITY SERVICE

One, two, skip a few, ninety-nine, one hundred. Repeat. One, two, skip a few, ninety-nine, one hundred. When I was growing up this was the joke of "How do you count to one hundred fast?" It is what I thought of as I counted and recounted the **230 pillowcases** we have had turned in to date for the **Douglas County Boys and Girls Club**. I spoke with the contact person there to make sure we were still on track with 175 or would she need more since they were available (thanks to y'all!). She stated due to tough times everywhere, their numbers had increased also and would need approximately 200! What an awesome feeling to be able to tell her this was not a problem! Every pillowcase that you have made will be given to them, solving my dilemma of where else they might be useful. Each pillowcase has been put into a quart size Ziploc bag and labeled as "Made for someone special by the Cherokee Rose Quilt Guild." I am in the process of setting up a date to give these pillowcases to them in the near future. . . watch for updates through your emails!

The deadline for the **Douglas County Homeless Shelter** quilts is here!! I have six turned in so far. Again, as last year, a small label will be put on each one stating that it was "Made by the Cherokee Rose Quilt Guild – Community Service Project 2010." Hard to believe as we swelter in this heat right now that cooler weather is just around the corner and these guilts will be very needed and much appreciated!

I have been looking for projects for next year; however, this is **YOUR GUILD** and I would like input from you! Remember items need to stay in Douglas County which can be challenging. But is there a ministry at your church that could benefit from quilts? Do you work with an agency that helps the community and could be an outlet for us? Put your thinking caps on and **HELP**!


NO LIBRARY CARD NEEDED

WORKSHOPS ON THE HORIZON

September 25, 2010, Workshop

Beads, Beads, Beads

Nationally known quilter Mary Stori (<u>www.marystori.com</u>) will teach us beading techniques that have practical applications for quilts and garments. Mary offers an in-depth discussion about beads; the care, storage,



equipment needs, and stabilizing methods. In the morning, we will create a reference sampler of basic stitches. We'll also learn to attach beads, charms, buttons, trinkets, & unusual objects. The afternoon focus is more decorative stitches, including picot stitch, chain stitch, branched fringe, netting, bugle bead walls, bead embroidery, and more. Mary uses live video projection, so everyone has a front row seat! No sewing machines or prior beading experience needed! The fee is \$35 for CRQG members; \$45 for nonmembers. The workshop will be opened to non-members on July 1, so sign up soon. A kit fee of \$10 payable to Mary is also required. It contains all the beads, embellishments and thread that you will need. YUMMY TREATS FROM BEVERLY

"Lime in the Coconut" Frosted Cheesecake Bars

Prep Time: 45 minutes Total Time: 3 hours, 50 minutes Makes: 24 bars

Cookie Base

- 1 Pouch (1 lb, 1.5 oz) Betty Crocker sugar cookie mix
- 2 Tablespoons all purpose flour
- 1/3 Cup butter or margarine, softened
- 1 egg, slight beaten

Filling

- 2 pkgs (8 oz each) cream cheese, softened
- 1 Can (16 oz) cream of coconut (not coconut milk)
- 3 Tablespoons lime juice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 eggs

Topping

- 1 container (12 oz) Betty Crocker whipped cream cheese frosting
- 1 ¼ cups coconut, toasted
- 2 teaspoons grated lime peel
- 1. Heat oven to 350. Spray bottom and sides of 13 x 9 pan with cooking spray. In large bowl, stir cookie base ingredients until soft dough forms. Press evenly in bottom of pan. Bake 15-18 minutes or until golden brown. Cool 15 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, in large bowl, beat cream cheese with mixer on medium until light and fluffy. Beat in cream of coconut until well blended. Beat in lime juice, vanilla and 2 eggs until smooth. Spread over cookie base.
- 3. Bake 40-45 minutes or until set and light golden brown on edges. Cool 30 minutes at room temperature. Refrigerate 1 hour to cool completely.
- 4. Carefully spread frosting over filling. Sprinkle with coconut and lime peel. Cover; refrigerate 30 minutes. For bars, cut into 6 rows by 4 rows. Store covered in refrigerator.

Additional Information

Creme of coconut is not available at WalMart but is at Kroger in the Mexican food section. It is on the bottom shelf and is a 15+ ounce can.

I used a fresh lime for the juice and peel; however, the next time I make it I think I will use "Nellie and Joe's" Famous Key West Lime Juice (also available at Kroger). I think this will give a little more lime flavor/kick to it. I'll do more grated lime peel also.

To me the most time consuming part was toasting the coconut. I used the "sweetened" so it was moist, which meant it had to dry out before it would 'toast.'

FEATURED MEMBER JOYCE HILL

How long have you been quilting? I made my first quilt in the early 60's. Then I took a break and had my kids. Then in the 80's, I started again.

Who taught you how to quilt? My mother-in-law.

What are your favorite quilting techniques? Appliqué.

What are your favorite colors to work with? Any color a long as it's not too bright.

What are your favorite fabrics to work with? Cotton.

What is your favorite quilt shop? Stitch 'N Quilt

If you sew by machine, what kind(s) do you use? Pfaff and Kenmore.

What inspires you to make a particular quilt? Most of the time it is the fabric. I like to pick a main fabric and then start from there.

What is your favorite quilting book or pattern? Any book or pattern that has appliqué in it.

On average, how many quilts do you make in a year? Four or 5 that are hand quilted; more than that when I quilt on the machine.

Do you quilt your own quilts or do you send them out? I always hand quilt my quilts unless they are to be given away.



What quilt-related item(s) are you working on right now? I have 2 old fashioned quilt frames. I have a quilt in each frame that I am quilting on now. I also have 10 tops ready to quilt and 5 tops in boxes to put together. Only one will be quilted on the machine. That one is for a granddaughter who will be 12 in April. That is "The Year of the Quilt" it is known around here.

What other hobbies do you have? I also oil paint and I love to work in the yard.

Tell about one way that quilting has changed your life. I love to relax and hand quilt. I have also made a lot of friends.

Are you on any committees with the CRQG? No.

Feel free to tell us more about yourself and your family. I have four granddaughters and only one likes to sew. I keep hoping some of the others will want to learn.

(Joyce donates much time and energy to various charitable organizations each year. This year, in addition to the many other contributions she made, she put together almost 100 pillowcases for the CRQG community service project for the Boys' and Girls' Club of Douglas County)



MACHINE APPLIQUÉ CLASS SUPPLY LIST SEPTEMBER 9, 2010

General Supply List

- Sewing machine in good working order which is able to do a zig-zag stitch that is adjustable both in width and length. A ¼" foot and any foot that you use for appliqué (open toe, walking foot, whatever)
- Thread: Superior or Sulky clear or grey monofilament poly (at present, Superior is difficult to find because of supplier problems, can use Sulky)
- Needle: 75/11 machine embroidery needle
- Black permanent Sharpie fine point marker
- Scissors: fabric and paper
- Pencil
- The book "Piece by Piece" by Sharon Schamber and Cristy Fincher is very helpful

Fabric

- Background, fat quarter of fabric (neutral color that will not "bleed") **DO NOT WASH** this fabric before the class

Other

- We will need irons and ironing surfaces to share.
- If you have a "light box" that would also be helpful to share with others. Jan Cunningham (the instructor) will bring 3 light boxes.
- Jan will also supply: special stabilizer, glue stick, liquid glue, orange stick, bias stem pieces. There will be a \$2 kit fee for these supplies.

BEADS, BEADS, BEADS SUPPLY LIST SEPTEMBER 25, 2010

This class features live video projection allowing every student a front-row seat!!

General Supply List

- An 8" or 10" wooden embroidery <u>hoop</u> and <u>two</u> pieces of muslin to fit hoop. An inexpensive hoop will do if you want to keep your sampler in the hoop permanently as a reference. Or, substitute an 11" pvc quilting frame if you already own one. . .it's not necessary to purchase especially for this class.
- sewing needle—the smallest quilting between you can thread, sizes #10, #11, or #12 generally work well
- long, thin appliqué needle, size #10 or #11 (also known as a "sharp")
- small shallow dish for beads—avoid plastic if possible
- small sharp scissors or thread clips
- small ruler—6" long x 1" wide is adequate
- lead pencil
- Ott light and extension cord (optional). . .you may end up dragging it with you only to find it's not possible to plug in due to the room set-up. I always request a nice, bright classroom and when we are lucky. . .it's available!
- optional—permanent pen for making notes on muslin sampler

Supply Fee: \$10 payable to instructor is required. Kit contains all the beads, embellishment items, and thread.

Instructor will have her books, quilting betweens, and some pvc frame available for purchase in class.


